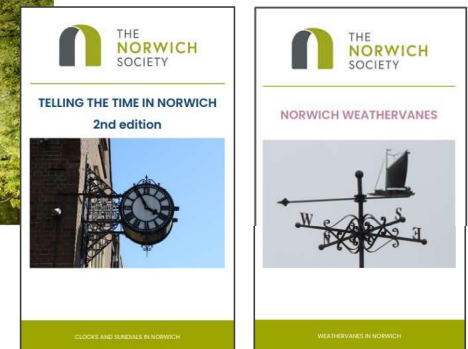

Treasurer's report and adoption of the Annual Accounts



2023 Accounts

- The Society's total income from General activities for the year ended 31 December 2023 was £28,763 compared to £26,304 in 2022, an increase of £2,459.
- The majority of the Society's income continued to be in the form of membership fees - total membership income for the year was £16,069 compared to £15,745 in 2022.
- General costs for 2023 totalled £47,088 compared to £26,031 in 2022. About £10,000 of this increase related to the the Society's website and on-line systems. Most of the remaining related to publications and eventsoffset by the additional income.
- Gift Aid reclaims continue to be an important source of income for the Society. The Gift Aid claim for 2023 amounted to £2,515, and this has been received from HMRC in 2024.
- Overall, the Society incurred a deficit of £18,325 in 2023 on General activities compared to a surplus of £273 in 2022. Whilst disappointing, the deficit was expected and largely reflected an under-investment in the Society's IT and website in recent years. The expectation is that the Society will not have any similar one-off costs in 2024.
- At 31 December 2023, the Society's total reserves amounted to £41,592. This included cash at bank of £39,978 compared to £56,071 at 31 December 2022.
- Subscription fees and events and publication prices have been increased enable a break-event budget to be achieved in 2024.

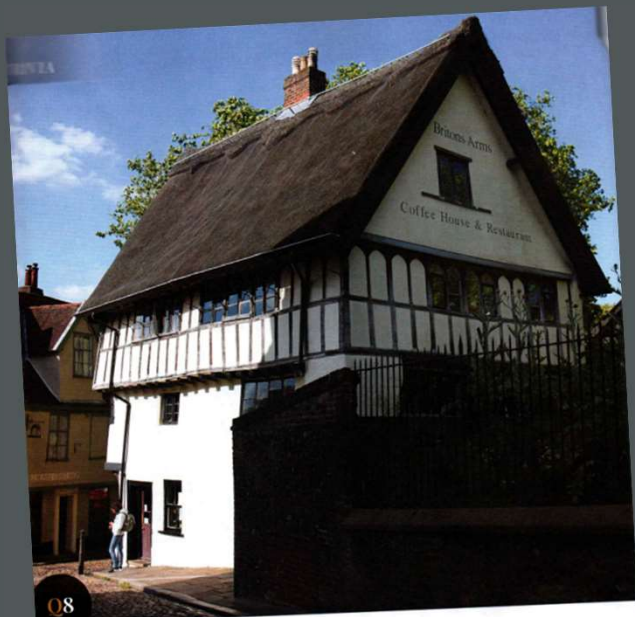

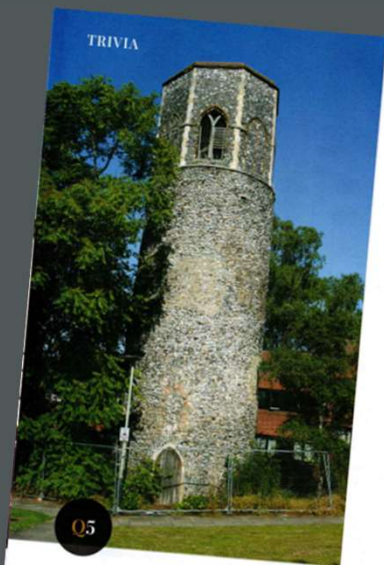

HAPPY 100TH BIRTHDAY

Imagine Norwich without Bishop Bridge, Elm Hill or the Assembly House. Norwich without the Norwich Society would be stripped of dozens of its most precious buildings.

Exactly 100 years ago a group of local people were so horrified by plans to demolish 14th century Bishop Bridge, that they founded the Norwich Society to save it.

Many successful campaigns later, historic city buildings were still being lost to decay and demolition, so in 1948 the Norwich Preservation Society and Norwich City Council to acquire and renovate threatened buildings.

A centenary exhibition, celebrating 100 years of the Norwich Society, runs at the Forum, Norwich, from September 8-12. During Heritage Open Days it highlights 100 places around the city which showcase the achievements of the Norwich Society. 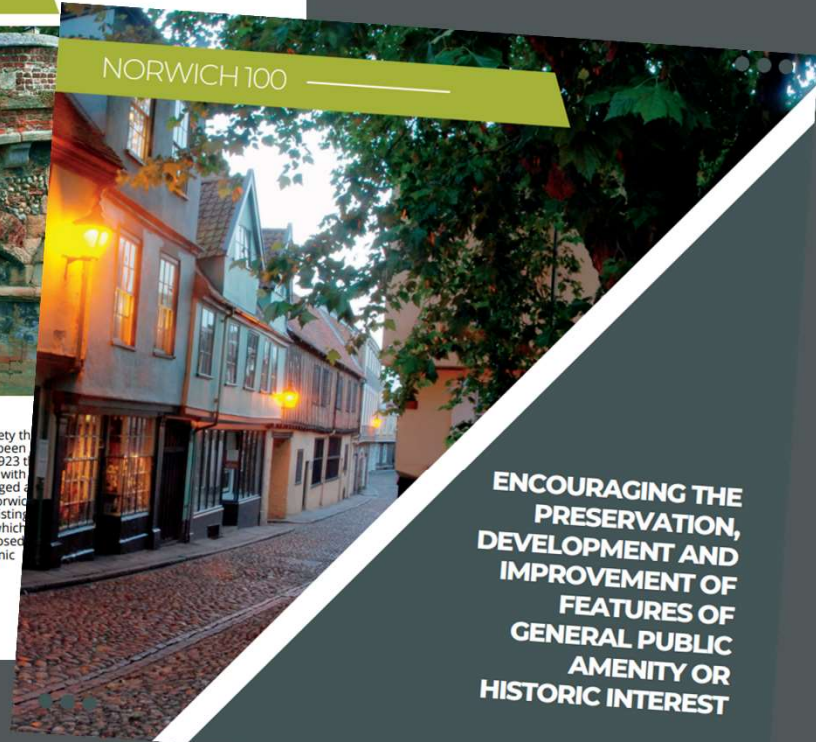


BISHOP BRIDGE



There is no other heritage building more important to the Norwich Society than this medieval bridge, which was built around 1340. The gatehouse had been taken down in 1791 as its weight threatened to damage the bridge. In 1923 the City wanted to widen the bridge for traffic and to replace the river piers with a span to improve the river flow and guard against flooding. This so enraged a group of Norwich architects and archaeologists that they formed the Norwich Society in March 1923. After having heard a talk on the procedures for listing buildings they drew up a list of 27 structures, including Bishop Bridge, which was subsequently placed on the Schedule of Ancient Monuments. The proposed widening work did not go ahead, and Bishop Bridge now provides a scenic pedestrian route into Norwich.

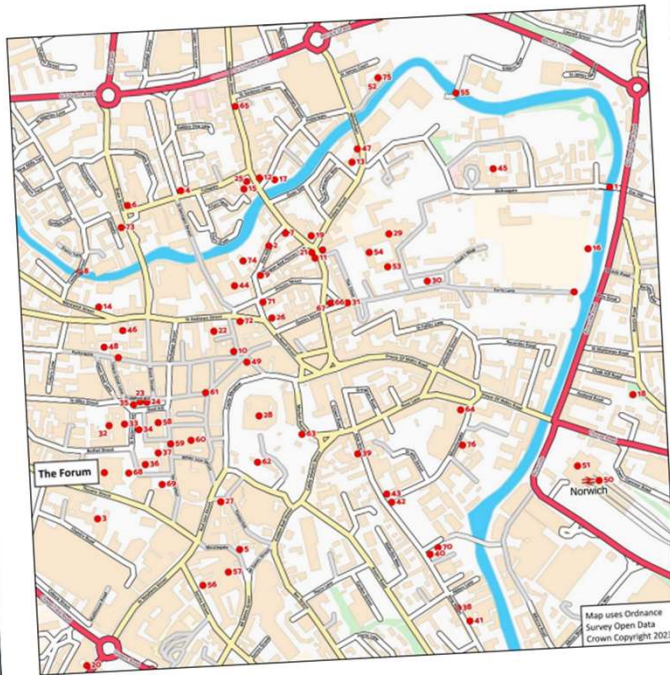
